Ozaukee County government saw value in preserving and educating the public in the history of the county. DEPOT DISPATCH ... KEEPING ON TRACK!

The Electric Interurban Railway Depot was the site of a special celebration held on the last weekend in September to mark the completed restoration of the historic depot and grand opening of the "Hazel Wirth Center". This center is the new home of the Ozaukee County Archives Research Center & Museum along with office and meeting facilities for the Society. If that wasn't enough to celebrate, it's also the "centennial" year of the Electric Interurban that served Ozaukee County from 1907 until 1948.



One hundred years ago at this very site, a celebration of another kind took place when a new age of transportation was born in Ozaukee County. In 1907, the Electric Interurban Railway began service from Milwaukee into Ozaukee County, and eventually Sheboygan County as well. This vital link between communities had widespread positive economic and social impact on the entire area.

Well over 2000 attended the weekend festivities to include complete building and archives tours, special displays, a number of tents featuring Society information and Interurban Railway historians, live music and a hospitality area serving snacks and refreshments. Thanks to the Milwaukee Light Engineering Society volunteers, 1/8 scale working Interurban Rail Duplex Cars were on site and operating on portable tracks giving rides to those attending.

The official dedication held at 1 PM Sunday was opened by Society President Mary Sayner who turned the program over to Past President and Project Chairman Curt Gruenwald.

The Wirth Family provided a major financial contribution to the project in loving memory of their Mother and Grandmother Hazel Wirth who was well respected and loved by many throughout the area. "Today, we remember Hazel Wirth, a lifelong Ozaukee County resident and friend of the Ozaukee County community for which the center now has its' name" commented Curt Gruenwald.

Former City Administrator Clint Gridley, now residing in Woodbury, Minnesota, worked with the Project Chairman on State and Federal Funding red tape and associated paperwork for the project, and served as a conduit for the grant funding process. Current City of Cedarburg Mayor, Greg Myers, applauded the dedication and steadfast efforts to accomplish the task despite many roadblocks met along the way. He expressed thanks for a first class restoration along with congratulations on behalf of the City of Cedarburg for the completion of this project that will serve residents and visitors to the area for future generations.

Ozaukee County Administrator, Tom Meaux, expressed his greetings and congratulations along with executing the honors to formally dedicate the building and site saying, "Today, we dedicate this polished gemstone for all of Ozaukee County residents and those beyond its' borders to utilize and enjoy! We officially dedicate the "Hazel Wirth Center" comprised of the Ozaukee County Archives Research Center and Museum along with offices and meeting facilities for the Society. May it serve us well as the Ozaukee County Historical Society continues to preserve and share the past for today and future generations!"

OCHS Newsletter Book Review

Along the Right-of-Way to Sheboygan, The Milwaukee Electric Railway and Light Company



Charles H. Damaske has written a moving trip through memories of The Milwaukee Electric Railway and Light Company. He started the project in 1987 with the worthy goal of concentrating on the involvement of the people of the time.

Damaske begins with a pictorial and historical overview of the Milwaukee-Northern Railway Company and communities along the line. I enjoyed the photographs because many of them were ones I had not seen in other publications.

The history of the line is uniquely captured in a series of fascinating newspaper articles. These include:

Cedarburg News articles starting on December 27, 1905 and ending May 19, 1948, **Port Washington Star** articles starting on November 4, 1905 and ending on August 19, 1948, and **Sheboygan Daily Press** articles starting March 23, 1908 and ending October 31, 1940.

The "I Remember When" section includes memories of several individuals that used the line as a way of life for work, school and recreation. I was most interested in the recollections of Vivian (Scherf) Laabs whose father Arnold Scherf was a motorman on the line. A visit to the Hazel Wirth Interur-

ban Depot Archives Research Center is an extra bonus because Vivian and her family have loaned Arnold's collection to the center for a special exhibit.

The summer season has brought in many vacationers. Folks plan their time to do some family research, and this includes a visit to the Archives, the cemeteries, and the Court House in search of any clues that they can add to their history.

We had a request for information to "settle a bet". This has happened before. While we get nothing for it, I must say I always learn something I would not have known before I went digging for answers.

One lady stopped in to find out where her grandparents lived many years ago. She had an old address which was no longer valid, but I was able to direct her to the location so she could check it out. She came back to tell me she found it and was so excited.

A young man from Arizona spent the good part of a day researching, and when he got back home he put his findings together on a disk which he sent to us on the Junghans Family. We are so happy to have this added to our genealogy department.

The Culture Center had a Plein Art Competition and one young man chose to do a watercolor of our Interurban Depot. He spent hours in the hot weather working on his project. When completed, he came to us with his mother and sister and gave it to us (with the ribbon he won still attached to it). This young man was 11 years old and did a fine job. We are so proud to display his work.

One day a lady and her daughter came in with a very heavy stone. She said they had been stepping on it for years. She knew it came from the school she went to, but could not remember the name, only the location. We were able to track that down for her and she was delighted. The stone was over the door of her school, Brookside,

Dist.#4 on Hwy 60 and Horns Corner Road, with the date 1885.

Our visitors enjoy looking at our artifacts and old photos. We recently had one lady in her young 90's looking over family photos and helping us to identify those we didn't know. How lucky for us that she was able to do this!

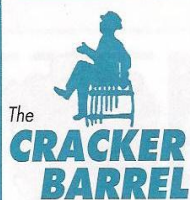

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR OCHS MEMBERS!

The Board of Directors of your Society have reviewed the membership dues structure and, due to rising costs of operations, has determined that an increase in the annual membership rates is necessary at this time.

Our last modest increase was in 2003 and at this point there are no alternatives but to raise the annual dues for membership. The new dues schedule is as follows:
