# KOREAN WAR VETERANS SERVICE MEDAL

The Republic of Korea has awarded the Korean War Veterans Service Medal to members of the armed forces from 21 UN member countries, in recognition of their Korean Service. The US Government has recently authorized Korean War Veterans to wear the medal.

In a change from previously announced intentions, the Department of Defense will be issuing the medals at **NO** charge to the veteran. Please see the attached information sheet and sample application letter.

### VA HEALTHCARE UPDATE

As you all should be aware of by now, The VA's Medical System is open to all veterans for enrollment. Did you know that it has been so successful in enrolling veterans, that you now have to wait upwards of a year after enrollment before you can start seeing a VA physician? The problem is even worse at some of the branch clinics that have been set up around the state. The Appleton Clinic has a waiting list that is in excess of 14 months! The CVSO's have a meeting scheduled with the regional director of the VA Healthcare System coming up, you can rest assured that this will be one of our primary points of discussion.



### VETERANS SUFFER EVERY DAY

There have been a number of recent studies, conducted by various agencies, which are looking into Gulf War Syndrome, Agent Orange (Dioxin), and Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder. ### **POW/MIA UPDATE**

North Korea recently repatriated the bodies of nine US personnel from areas inside North Korea.

Three more sets of remains, were returned by the Vietnamese in a ceremony held in Hanoi. See attached article for further updates.

All of the bodies were sent to the Identification Laboratory in Hawaii for processing.

#### **Bringing Them Home At Last**

Everyone has seen the news footage at one time or another; the remains of a long dead American service member, fallen in a far away battlefield during a long-ago war, are returned to his country in a brief, moving ceremony. And after the body is loaded onto the U.S. Military aircraft that is inevitably waiting to fly it home, everyone knows the first stop will be the Army's Central Identification Laboratory at Hickam Air Force Base, HI. The lab is the largest forensic anthropology facility of its kind in the world. The concept of what the lab does today began during the Vietnam War, when two Army mortuaries operated in South Vietnam to identify

remains of U.S. service members. After the withdrawal of U.S. forces and the closing of the mortuaries in 1972 and 1973, the Army established a central laboratory in Thailand that was relocated to the U.S. after the South Vietnamese government fell in 1975. The current lab was established in May of 1976.

What most do not realize, is that the vast majority of the people who work for the lab, do not work at the lab. These are the individuals who make up the search teams, who go out into the field to do the actual research and recovery operations. There are currently 13 of these teams that are assigned to various locations around the world, doing the recovery work, often in far from hospitable conditions.

The lab Director is Col. David Pagano, USA. He says the following regarding the mission of the lab; "What we do has a tremendous meaning to the families who have lost loved ones. Once they know what happened, they can find closure. And that's something we owe them as a country...because of the sacrifices they have made of their loved ones, and because of the way we Americans value our service and value our people. Every time a service member is identified and the press writes about it, America remembers the sacrifice the military is willing to

make, in terms of giving their lives for this nation."


