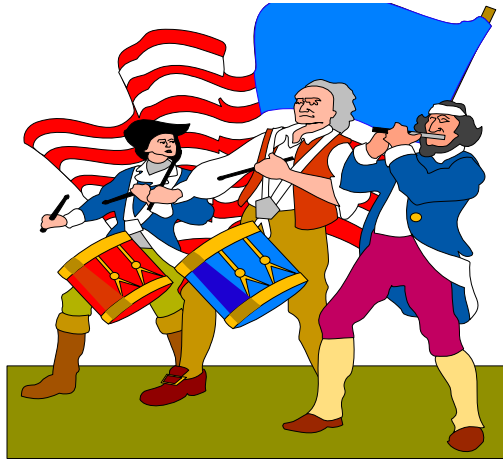

# Federal Legislation

There are a number of bills in Congress that will affect veterans benefits, if they are passed.

A number of these bills are going nowhere.

In the past, it has been the track-record for Congress, and the Administration to talk a good game, but fail to come through when it counts.

It boggles the mind to see Congress and the Administration fail to come to the plate to help not only our fellow veterans, but fail to provide those serving on active duty any incentive to remain in the military.

With so few in Congress having any military service of their own, and heaven forbid that any of THEIR children should serve, it shouldn't surprise any of us.

Its an election year, time to remind them who we are!

# State Issues

The Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs will be holding a "Stake-holder's" Conference again this year to show "interested parties" the current state of the Veteran's Trust Fund, as well as actions to date to sustain the fund for the long-term.

Several initiatives in the State Legislature over the past year have contributed to maintaining the "solvency" of the Trust Fund, not the least of which was the passage of SB-613. This act, (it has been signed by the Governor) will provide 100% tuition remission to Wisconsin Veterans who attend a UW system school. Unfortunately, it will not "kick-in" until the fall of 2007.

Property Tax relief for 100% service-connected veteran was a real nice "feel good" bill, but did not cover a broad enough spectrum of our fellow veterans. The veterans service organizations will continue to work with the legislature to "enhance" this bill, and open it up to more of our most deserving veterans.

## Veterans' Day at State Fair

Every year, during the "run" of State Fair, the last Sunday of the fair is designated as "Veterans Day".

The fair runs this year from August 3rd through August 13th, with August 13 being the "Veterans' Day".

I hope to have some discount coupons for admission to the fair for that day.

Plans are still in development as to what the "emphasis" will be this year. If something dramatic unfolds, I'll keep you informed through a separate mailing.



## VA RECORDS FIASCO

As many of you know, the Department of Veterans Affairs has had a serious breach of their internal security, which POTENTIALLY could expose millions of current and former members of the military to identity theft.

The attached articles give some basic guidance as to

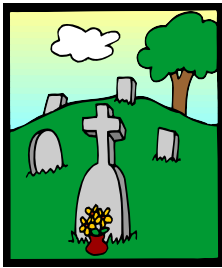
what we all should do to make sure we do not fall victim to some ne'er do well, who may have access to our personal information.

The North Koreans continue to "play games" on all fronts, not the least of which is allowing our teams into their country to try and locate remains. So, we have suspended searches in that country for the time being.

I frequently get asked about these benefits, and their availability from the VA.

If you do not have a service connected disability, that specifically relates to any of the above, the chances that you will receive these services from the VA is mighty slim!

There are certain exceptions given for the extremely low income, and those who's VA doctor specifically recommends receive these areas of care.

Otherwise, don't bet the farm on getting help in these areas!



## WDVA Offers a Personal Loan for ANY Purpose

The Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs has recently announced that they have made some changes to their Personal Loan Program.

As part of the on-going changes to our State Veterans Benefits, WDVA has changed not only the available loan amounts, but also the available terms for repayment.



As you can see from the attached, loans are available for up to \$25,000.

Remember that proceeds from the loans are what helps fund the Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs benefits to our fellow veterans.
